The Lord led many people in the past to stand strong even during some difficult times at Pleasant Valley South. I've heard senior adults tell how they considered closing the doors at PVS on Sunday nights because attendance was poor. A few members volunteered to continue coming on Sunday evening to light the lanterns and worship. Our challenge is to pass this church to the next generation as a strong witness for Christ.

The PVS family broke ground on our \$2.3 million worship center on August 13, 2000. We held our final service in our previous sanctuary on February 10, 2002. We voted to remodel that sanctuary, transforming it into our current Children's Building. We paid \$350,000 cash for that project. August 19, 2007, we voted to build the Awana Game room and new education building for \$1.8 million. We are blessed to have these ministry facilities on 44 acres.

Our present debt from the construction projects totals \$1.7 millon. I invite you to participate in our Heritage Fund to retire the debt early. This is a sacrificial gift **above** your tithe. Every month some of you already give to the "Capital Campaign", and that money is used for payments and to pay the principal. The challenge is for you to give this extra amount for at least three years.

I ask you to make this a matter of prayer. You are generous with your giving to ministry needs of PVS. No one will contact you or request you to sign a commitment card.

Delaine and I decided to continue our gift to debt retirement two years ago when the last campaign ended. We ask you to join us so we may pass a strong church to the next generation debt free!

God's Goodness Proved Over and Over...

Today, Sherie and I were discussing how time passes, so quickly. We will have been married nineteen years in May. Over the years we've experienced both abundance and scarcity, but the Lord has always provided for us in ways we never could have imagined! We attribute this to tithing; to giving the Lord the first ten percent of our earnings.

I remember discussing our first budget and thinking this tithing thing is expensive. Sherie asked, "Can we afford to give that much to the church every week?" It was a small sum of money; however, looking back, we could not have afforded to withhold what wasn't ours in the first place. Ever since that day, we've tithed and learned three key principles that we'd like to share.

First, tithing will keep you from excessive debt. You may ask, "How does that work?" It's a simple formula: give 10%, save 10% and consume 80%. When we put this formula to work, it caused us to sell the two brand new sports cars we owned when we got married. Plus, I no longer needed the "cool car" because now I had the girl! Over the years, this concept has helped us develop better financial habits and avoid burdensome debt by buying things we did not need. It's hasn't always been easy, and we've strayed off course at times from the saving part, but it works.

Second, He is the provider and we are just stewards. In the fall of 2008 my employer hit extremely hard times due to the recession. I remember laying-off ten or more employees one day only to think, "I'm so glad that was not me." The next week it was me. After weeks of searching for a new job, I realized we were in for a long hunt. Needless to say, we immediately had to cut expenses since we were living off savings. It came time to tithe, and then we realized that 10% of \$0 = \$0. It was a "light bulb" moment. He is the provider! I remember praying, "Lord, I cannot give to you unless you help me find a job." This experience changed my life. Yes, the Lord expects us to work hard, but ultimately He is the one that controls the economy, our health and every other factor that worries us daily. He is provider, and we are just stewards.

Third, it's truly better to give than to receive. My parents taught me this as a child and teenager, but it never made sense. Why would anyone think it's better to give than to receive? There were so many things I wanted. I now understand. Jesus said, *For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also* (Mathew 6:21). There is nothing better than making an investment into God's Kingdom here on earth. It helps you keep your priorities straight. This goes beyond giving things to your children. It means helping those in need and investing in things that will have an eternal impact. The joy of giving is so much greater than acquiring more stuff.

Like so many others, we've seen God's goodness proved over and over through tithing. It's an act of worship and not a promise of wealth. God just wants us to be obedient. If this is not something you have been doing, we encourage you to get involved immediately. Don't miss out on giving God your first fruits.

For this is the love of God, that we keep His commandments. And His commandments are not burdensome. For whatever is born of God overcomes the world. And this is the victory that has overcome the world our faith. (1 John 5: 3-4 NKJV)

This past fall I led a Bible Study on Kelley Minter's book, *What Love Is*, based on 1, 2 and 3 John. One of the major lessons God taught me through this study was how obedience and love are inexplicably intertwined. You cannot divorce one from the other. John clearly states that the love of God is keeping His commandments. If I love God, I will obey Him, period, in **all** areas of my life. There is no menu here for me to choose which commands I want to obey, and which I can just ignore. Love God? Obey Him.

This was most definitely a hard pill to swallow because, of course, as a sinner, I am not always obedient. Obedience is hard; it can be lonely; it can sometimes mean doing things I don't want to do and not doing things I want to do. From a worldly perspective obedience can seem to be a burden, a kill-joy; but from God's perspective obedience is freedom and can bring the greatest joy we can experience this side of heaven.

John goes on to say that God's commandments are not burdensome. That's interesting. When I read this passage I think of what it was like to be a teenager and having to obey the rules my mom made for me (and there were a lot of them). At that time I felt her rules were a burden and because that was my perspective on following commandments, it was not natural for me to transition to believing that following God's commandments would be any different. However, as I have spent more time with God and more time in His Word, I have come to truly see that following His commandments brings true freedom. I have experienced more of God's power and joy in my life because in spending time in His Word DAILY, I have learned who God is and that I can trust Him no matter what. I have learned to keep my focus on how my obedience proves that I love Him instead of focusing on how hard obedience feels in the moment.

Ok, so if I love God, I will obey Him. His commandments are not burdensome. Thank goodness John does not stop there. I know I do not have what it takes to obey in my own strength. John adds an important component to our obedience: faith. Faith in Jesus Christ is the victory that overcomes the world with all its pulls and temptations.

So, let's be honest. It seems like one of the hardest commandments for Christians to obey God and show that we love Him is in our giving. Pleasant Valley South currently has a debt of about \$1.7 million. This is God's church. We are the body of Jesus, and if there was ever a time we need to be obedient it is now. We need to show the world that we put God first. Tithing is not easy, but it is rewarding. Giving is a demonstration of not only our commitment to the church, but also our love for God. If we are obedient in this area, God will provide the necessary means to carry out this task. He WILL BLESS! Pray for the Holy Spirit to move in your heart to not only give your tithe, but to give generously to support the work that God is doing in our community and around the world.

We plan to continue to offer within our walls the type of concerts we have experienced in the last couple of years with the Annie Moses Band and Guy Penrod.

Long range plans for the orchestra and handbells are to have the handbells sent off for retuning as that should be done about every two to three years, and this year would be the time to have that done. I would also like to add a fourth octave to the handbell choir. For the orchestra we need a dedicated rehearsal room to use when we can't rehearse in the Worship Center. We now have an arrangement that will keep us from having to move everything from the Worship Center to the Chapel by purchasing another drum set, a dozen music stands, and an electric piano to keep in the storage area of the Chapel. The electric piano we had literally died just before the Christmas Candlelight Service. This way all we have to move is the music and personal instruments.

- Goal is to keep the students involved in our different ministry opportunities: includes Bible study, small groups, accountability, missions, music, worship, leadership, and service projects in the community
- Keep the ministry well balanced by keeping it exciting while at the same time challenging and life changing
- Show care and compassion for the students that we encounter: includes praying for each of them daily and providing ways to bridge the gap with students and the older generations

- Provide opportunities for our students to use their talents in music, bands, playing instruments, etc., on Sunday nights at 5:00 p.m.
- Along with my students and volunteers, I plan to be more aggressive in finding ways to reach out to the churched and unchurched students and families in our community.

Since before I could even walk, I have been at PVSBC and have been able to see our church grow and thrive under the leadership of Pastor Phil May. It is our goal to soon retire our debt so that we can better minister to our church and the communities surrounding us.

Giving generously towards the Heritage Campaign will open doors for both the contemporary worship service and college ministry to expand and reach others for His glory. Over the past three years, College Core has grown from a small ministry of approximately three students to now almost thirty college students and recent graduates. We were able to join the student ministry on a mission trip two years ago and are currently planning our second trip to Peru along with our Associate Pastor, Billy Fricks. Retiring the church debt would allow us to potentially plan more local and international mission trips as well as invest more in our own students and leaders by going on retreats—both for leadership purposes and to develop a greater sense of community and discipleship among students. The Heritage Campaign will also allow College Core to have more of a physical presence on local college campuses, as we would have the financial means to be involved in more activities and reach new students through advertising.

In regard to the contemporary worship service, this campaign would provide a great deal of opportunity for us to reach even more people in the community for Christ as we offer a different style of worship. Technology is ever-changing, and as our service quickly approaches the five-year mark, it is imperative that we are progressing with the current technology in order to provide a quality simulcast service; this includes maintaining the equipment that we already own as well as upgrading to new technologies to serve us better as our needs change. Retiring the debt would also enable our worship team to be more outwardly focused by giving us the financial means to hold more community wide events, such as holding a Good Friday Community Worship event in downtown Rome. I would also like to see the contemporary worship service begin a coffee ministry that seeks to encourage pre-service community that would create a more welcoming and relaxed environment for our guests and members (Hebrews 10:24-25). In conclusion, I am grateful for Pleasant Valley South Baptist Church and the leadership of Pastor Phil May as he challenges our church to give above and beyond. I pray that you would seek the Lord and allow Him to lead you regarding how you should give to the Heritage Campaign.
